Award Winners Honored

The American Nature Study Society's 1992 and 1993 Eva L. Gordon Award winning authors were both honored at the National Science Teacher's Association Convention in Kansas City on Saturday, April 3, 1993. The ANSS and the NSTA combined their talents and resources to sponsor a reception and an awards presentation for the authors.

Paul Spector, immediate Past President of the ANSS presented the Eva L. Gordon Award for children's science literature to the 1992 recipient, Byrd Baylor and the 1993 recipient, Dr. Augusta Goldin. The award, established in 1962, is given to those authors who best personify the teachings and spirit of Eva Gordon.

Eva Gordon was a pioneer in writing children's science literature having co-authored two primary grade textbooks of nature stories long before science books for little children existed. These books were based on her firsthand knowledge of the outdoors and her experience in teaching first and second graders in the public schools of Milwaukee. These two modest books entitled Fall and Autumn beautifully demonstrated the twin requirements for good authorship: knowledge of the topic and of the reader.

Byrd Baylor and Augusta Goldin have been writing science books for children since the early 1960's. Byrd Baylor views her books Everybody Needs a Rock, The Other Way to Listen, When Clay Sings, and The Way to Start Your Day as ways and means of sharing her small part of the earth--her home in the desert--with all of us.

Dr. Augusta Goldin, from Staten Island, New York, has spent a lifetime in education with positions as classroom teacher, administrator and university professor working diligently for the advancement of science education in the elementary school and that it be taught on an interdisciplinary level. Her books epitomize her life's work: teaching science to children in a language they can easily understand. Her publications include Ducks Don't Get Wet, Geothermal Energy-AHot Prospect, and Small Energy Sources-Chokes That Work.

The American Nature Study Society is proud to add Byrd Baylor and Augusta Goldin to the list of Eva L. Gordon Award winners.

National Trends in Environmental Education

Currently nine states have mandated environmental education programs: Wisconsin, North Carolina (solid waste issues only), Ohio, Pennsylvania, Washington, Arizona, Florida, Maryland, and Minnesota. There are six states that encourage incorporating environmental education into existing curricula. Six states require that teachers be certified in environmental education.

Forty-nine states have Environmental Education Offices. Sixteen of them are in Departments of Education, and 33 are shared between Departments of Education and Departments of Environmental Protection/Natural Resources. Pennsylvania is one of the few states that has an independent Office of Environmental Education.

Nine states have advisory boards, commissions or councils attached to state agencies: Florida, Arizona, Alabama, Hawaii, Kentucky, Minnesota, Texas, California, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin.

William Hillcourt

Well-known author and long-time member of ANSS, William Hillcourt, died November 9, 1992 at the age of 92. He was on the final leg of a round-theworld tour promoting his scouting handbooks when he was stricken in Stockholm.

Born in Denmark as Vilhelm Bjerregaard-Jensen, he emigrated to this country in 1926 and was naturalized in 1939. While studying pharmacy, he started writing boy's fiction and editing the official Danish Scout magazine. When he came to the United States he joined the national staff of the Boy Scouts of America, editing and writing several Scouting handbooks: Boy Scout Handbook, Handbook for Patrol Leaders, Handbook for Scoutmasters, and Scout Field Book. Along with Lady Baden-Powell, he wrote the biography of the founder of Scouting, Lord Baden-Powell. For many years he wrote stories for boys published in Boys' Life magazine.

Bill Hillcourt made a significant contribution to nature study when he published the Field Book of Nature Activities (Putnam) in 1950 [expanded in later years into the Field Book of Nature Activities and Conservation (1961)] and the Field Book of Nature Activities and Hobbies (1970). He was author of the Golden Book of Camping (1971), one of the Golden Guides series. These books are filled with practical ideas for hands-on activities, still relevant today as we help people interact in constructive ways with the natural world.

Mulaiks Move to Georgia

Stan and Dodie Mulaik have moved from Salt Lake City to Stone Mountain, Georgia after long and distinguished careers in their adopted state of Utah. Stan served ANSS well for 20 twenty years as editor of the ANSS News, later expanded into the journal Nature Study. He and Dodie did their "Nature Creeps" workshop at the National Wildlife Federation Conservation Summits all around the country after Stan retired from the zoology department at the University of Utah.

The Mulaiks were honored by the Utah Nature Study Society and the city of Murray, Utah with a beautiful bench where hikers along the Jordan River can stop to rest and contemplate nature. We wish them many more years of fruitful and rewarding nature activity in the milder climes of the South.

Build a Birdfeeder

Concepts:

Students will recycle throw-away objects into birdfeeders.

Objectives:

- 1. Design and build a birdfeeder out of throw-away items.
- 2. Students will learn one way to decrease trash build-up by reusing it.

Time Required:

45 - 60 minutes

Level:

5th grade to adult

Materials:

Rinsed clean half gallon milk cartons
Plastic two liter soda bottles
Plastic gallon milk jugs
acrylic paint
Sharp cutting tools

Milk Carton Feeder


- 1. Mark a line .75" from the bottom on the front of the carton.
- 2. 2" in on the left side make a 1" mark. Draw a diagonal line from the corner of the .75" line to the 1" mark. Repeat on the right side.
- 3. On the left side draw a 4" line on a diagonal from the 1" mark up to to the corner of the on the front of the corner. Repeaton the right side.
 - 4. Cut along these lines creating a flap. Fold the flap inward.
 - 5. Punch a hole through the top for a hanging string.
 - 6. Paint with non-toxic paint.


2-Liter Bottle Feeder

1. If the bottle has a dark plastic bottom cap (like a Pepsi bottle), wash under hot water and pull the cap off.

2. In each node of the bottom make a .75" cut across. Then cut upward on a diagonal .75" of an inch so the top of the flap is 1" wide.


3. Punch a hole through the bottle cap for a hanging string.





- 1. Mark a 1" line half way around the milk jug.
- 2. Cut along this line and then cut a half circle out. Cover edge with masking tape.
- 3. Punch a few drainage holes in the bottom.
- 4. Paint
- 5. Use the handle to tie to a tree.
